George Fox University is a nationally recognized, fully accredited Christian university, located in Newberg, Oregon, with regional centers in Portland and Salem. George Fox has been ranked by *Forbes* as the top Christian college in America and was the first university on the West Coast to offer adult degree programs. At George Fox, we promise that all students will “Be Known” academically, socially, and spiritually. You will not be a number. You will be known.

What types of Adult Degree programs does George Fox University offer?

George Fox University offers programs to assist working adults in completing their bachelor’s degrees. The majors that can be pursued through this program include: **Management & Organizational Leadership, Healthcare Administration, Technology Management, Social & Behavioral Studies,** and **Project Management.** We also offer an **Elementary Education** degree-completion program, but requirements are different than ones listed here.

What is the format of the program?

George Fox University offers two types of classes: **General Education classes** and **Major classes.** General Education classes are offered each semester in two sessions. Major classes are held in a **cohort** format, a group of students who go through the 16-month degree completion program together. In the cohort, students generally go through three classes (9 credits) each semester (4 semesters total), focusing on one class at a time. All classes are held one night a week, from 6-10 p.m., at our **Portland** or **Salem** centers and are designed specifically for adult learners.

If a student needs elective credits, George Fox offers a program that awards up to 30 semester credits for prior learning or professional training. Contact the University for more information

What are the requirements for admission?

Students apply to George Fox University as either **General Education** students or as **Major** students. To apply for admission, all students must:

- ▶ Complete an application for admission (available online)
- ▶ Have 20 or more transferable semester hours to begin **General Education** coursework
- ▶ Have 62 or more transferable semester hours to begin **Major** coursework
- ▶ Provide Professional and Personal/Academic Reference forms
- ▶ Submit sealed, official transcripts from all post-secondary institutions attended
- ▶ Have a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher (2.5 for major admission)
- ▶ Have a minimum of 3 years post-high school work experience, documented in a résumé (5 for major admission)
- ▶ Earn a minimum of 6/16 on the admissions writing sample assessment
- ▶ Submit an application fee of \$40.00

I have at least 20 semester hours (30 quarter hours), but fewer than 62 semester hours (93 quarter hours).

You may apply to George Fox University in order to take **General Education** classes to work toward having 62 semester hours, which will then qualify you to apply to the major.

I have 62 or more semester hours (93 quarter hours), but fewer than 90 semester hours (135 quarter hours).

You may apply to George Fox University in order to take **Major (cohort)** classes in the 16-month program. However, you may need to take additional classes to fulfill general education or elective requirements.

I have 90 semester hours (135 quarter hours) or more completed.

You may apply to George Fox University in order to take **Major (cohort)** classes in the 16-month program. Depending on your transcript evaluation, you may not need to take any additional classes.

I have or will have a Washington Direct Transfer Associate Degree.

You may apply to George Fox University in order to take **Major (cohort)** classes in the 16-month program. You will have fulfilled the General Education requirements, but may need to take classes for elective requirements.

These can include courses that cover wellness, stress management, physical activity, or nutrition. No more than 2 semester credits can be in a single Physical Education subject (i.e., more than 2 credits in swimming).

Humanities: 9 Semester Credits

Humanities courses generally are from the areas of Art, Ethics, History, Literature, Philosophy, Music, and Theatre. Students must have credits from at least two different areas.

Of the 12 semester credits, up to 6 semester credits may be from areas considered to be "Fine Arts"--Art, Music, and Theatre. Of the 6 Fine Arts credits, up to 3 credits may be of an applied nature (i.e., acting, sculpting, drawing, etc.).

Only one Religion or Bible course may be used in the Humanities area.

Up to 6 credits of a foreign language can count toward the Humanities requirement, as long as it is a 200-level course or higher.
