It has been 20 years since the George Fox University Theatre produced its 2002 award-winning production of *Godspell*. That year, the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival invited us to perform *Godspell* at its regional festival in Bellingham, Washington. In order to fundraise for the trip, we also performed the show at the Winningstad Theatre in downtown Portland. If you were part of that production, welcome back! We're glad you're here.

While I arrived one year after that moment in George Fox theatre history, one of the judges for the 2002 production later told me that the energy in Wood-Mar the night he saw the show was electric, filled with hope and reverence, as if he'd entered a worship experience that unabashedly celebrated a community's faith. What a great compliment, and what a great vision for what theatre can do!

Godspell opened in New York City in 1976, and was heralded for setting the gospel in a contemporary urban landscape. The show was quirky, clownlike, and yet profound. The show was updated for its 2012 Broadway revival to bring it into the 21st century, but both its quirkiness and power remain. May you experience both the laughter and the hope this musical has to offer tonight.

Much has changed in the world since the our 2002 production of Godspell, but the need for this story remains the same. We are simply delighted to invite you back to Wood-Mar Auditorium to experience this beautiful, prophetic musical all over again.

CREATORS BIOS

Stephen Schwartz wrote the music and lyrics for the current Broadway hit Wicked, and has also contributed music and/or lyrics to Godspell, Pippin, The Magic Show, The Baker's Wife, Working (which he also adapted and directed), Rags, and Children Of Eden. He collaborated with Leonard Bernstein on the English texts for Bernstein's Mass and wrote the title song for the play and movie Butterflies Are Free. For children, he has written songs for two musicals, Captain Louie and My Son Pinocchio. He has also worked in film, collaborating with Alan Menken on the songs for Disney's Enchanted as well as the animated features Pocahontas and TheHunchback Of Notre Dame, and writing the songs for the DreamWorks animated feature The Prince Of Egypt. His first opera, Seance On A Wet Afternoon, was produced at Opera Santa Barbara and New York City Opera. A book about his career, Defying Gravity, has been released by Applause Books. Schwartz has been inducted into the Theatre Hall of Fame and the Songwriters Hall of Fame, and has been given a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame . Awards include three Academy Awards, four Grammy Awards, and a tiny handful of tennis trophies.

John Michael Tebelak originally wrote Godspell as his Masters Thesis project at Carnegie-Mellon in 1971. Subsequently, he directed productions of Godspell at La MaMa Theatre, the Cherry Lane Theatre, the Promenade Theatre, and on Broadway. He received the 1971 Drama Desk award for Most Promising Director. In 1972, Tebelak directed the play, Elizabeth I on Broadway, and off-Broadway staged The Glorious One in 1975 and Ka-Boom in 1980. He is also co-writer of the 1973 film of Godspell with David Greene. He was dramaturg for the Cathedral Church of St. John the Divine in New York and staged liturgical drama there, and the church's theatre bears his name. Tebelak died April 2, 1985, of a heart attack in New York City.
