COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER

Shawn Daley, dean, College of Education; vice president of strategic initiatives

Dr. Shawn Daley serves as dean of the College of Education at George Fox University. He oversees programs in teacher preparation, educational leadership, and an expanding set of innovative partnerships with

K-12 districts across Oregon. In addition to his role as dean, he continues to guide the university's Early College Program and strategic educational services team through his ongoing service as vice president of strategic relationships.

His career before joining George Fox spanned more than 25 years, including stints as a high school history teacher, a professor of educational technology, and a chief innovation officer. He is a consultant to colleges, universities, and K-12

systems nationwide on program design, technology integration, and institutional strategy.

Daley's research sits at the intersection of history education, emerging technologies, and expanding access for learners with disabilities. He has presented internationally on immersive technologies, artificial intelligence, and robots in education. His work has earned recognition as an Apple Distinguished Educator, a Christa McAuliffe Award from the National Council for the Social Studies, and the Community Leadership Award from SEDCOR. Recently, his focus has turned toward improving postsecondary access for rural learners and reversing the exodus of young men from postsecondary education and the teaching profession.

Daley holds a PhD in educational psychology and educational technology from Michigan State University, an MA in history from Portland State University, an MAT from George Fox University, and a BA in history from Loyola University Maryland. He is also a graduate of the Academy for Higher Education Innovation Leadership, the Council of Independent Colleges Executive Leader Academy, and the P3EDU Fellowship program.

He and his wife, Cadie – a longtime Portland Public Schools teacher – live in North Portland. He's active in his parish community and serves on several nonprofit boards.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic regalia generally consist of cap, gown and hood worn on formal occasions at institutions of higher learning. It originated in the medieval period, when the vast majority of scholars were of the clergy. The gown evolved from what most likely was the clergy's robe. The gown was originally black, but color was introduced as institutions left ecclesiastical control. The bachelor's gown is worn closed and is distinguished by its pointed sleeves. A master's gown is designed to be worn closed with long, crescent-shaped sleeves. The doctor's garb may be worn open or closed with velvet panels down the front and three bars on the round, bell-shaped sleeves.

The most distinguishing feature of the academic attire is the hood. The hood originated as the skull cap worn by the clergy to protect their heads from the elements. The hood served a three-fold purpose: head covering, shoulder cap, and bag for alms. The size and shape of the hood designates not only the college degree of the wearer, but also the university he or she attended. The master's hood is three and one-half feet in length, while the doctor's hood is rounded and measures four feet in length. Hoods are lined with the official colors of the institution conferring the degree. The official colors of George Fox University are old gold and navy blue. The binding around the hood is velvet, with the color indicative of the major field of study.

The list of graduate names was provided to the printer several days prior to commencement to allow production of this program. The status of some candidates may have changed since that time. Some candidates will not have completed all requirements for their degrees; others not listed will have completed requirements. The listing of a name in this program does not obligate George Fox University to award a degree. For official purposes, a final corrected list of graduates will be retained by the Office of the Registrar.
