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## COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER

Carl Lloyd, *George Fox University professor emeritus of management*

After a career that included serving in the U.S. Navy, working in factories and residential construction, and providing pastoral counseling for home missions groups and large churches in five states,

Carl Lloyd joined George Fox in July of 1994. He remained at the university for 28 years, teaching at satellite campuses in Tigard, Eugene, Salem and Boise along the way, until his retirement in December of 2021. He continues to teach at the institution on an adjunct basis.



Since retiring, Carl began serving mental health needs at Discover Counseling in Tigard, a ministry launched by two George Fox graduates, Aaron Potratz (2007) and Nathan Hawkes (2004). They also host a podcast known as “Shrink Think.”

Recognized as the university’s Teacher of the Year in 1999, Carl arrived at George Fox after logging teaching experience that spanned the elementary school through doctoral levels. He served at six universities in Colorado, Ohio, Texas and Oregon, and also worked with nine different hospitals (medical-surgical and psychiatric). He was the superintendent for Life Christian Schools for four years and additionally launched several nonprofit organizations to better serve human needs: Good News Encounters, Empowering Systems, and Mending Ministries, which provide training and pro bono counseling services.

Carl has earned four master’s degrees and two doctoral degrees. He and his wife Connie were married in 1974 and adopted three infants from Philadelphia when they pastored in New York and Texas. They also adopted one of their 12 grandchildren.

In today’s commencement speech, he will explore the stories of several “lifespan learners” who are serving the needs of others through their unique passions and learning styles.

## ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic regalia generally consist of cap, gown, and hood worn on formal occasions at institutions of higher learning. It originated in the medieval period when the vast majority of scholars were of the clergy. The gown evolved from what most likely was the clergy's robe. The gown was originally black, but color was introduced as institutions left ecclesiastical control. The bachelor's gown is worn closed and is distinguished by its pointed sleeves. A master's gown is designed to be worn closed with long, crescent-shaped sleeves. The doctor's garb may be worn open or closed with velvet panels down the front and three bars on the round, bell-shaped sleeves.

The most distinguishing feature of the academic attire is the hood. The hood originated as the skull cap worn by the clergy to protect their heads from the elements. The hood served a three-fold purpose: head covering, shoulder cap, and bag for alms. The size and shape of the hood designates not only the college degree of the wearer but also the university he or she attended. The master's hood is three and one-half feet in length, while the doctor's hood is rounded and measures four feet in length. Hoods are lined with the official colors of the institution conferring the degree. The official colors of George Fox University are old gold and navy blue. The binding around the hood is velvet with the color indicative of the major field of study.
